Dear Parents and Carers,

We know from our conversations with you at parents evenings and your feedback from our parent questionnaires that you appreciate being well informed about what your child is learning at each stage of the year.

We are writing to provide you with an overview of the curriculum and details of what your child will be learning this year.

Our mission statement is "Learning Together For The Future." We work very hard to ensure that all members of our school community acquire the knowledge and skills required for now and for a fulfilling future. Our curriculum is designed to help students to develop confidence in themselves and their abilities, to feel valued and value others and to appreciate the world at large.

We believe that all our students have talents and abilities that it is our responsibility to discover and develop. We know that when we have the highest expectations of what young people can achieve they rarely fail to thrive. And so our curriculum is designed on the basis that intelligence is a muscle, not a fixed quantity.
