


The aim is to go beyond the popular approach to Film, taking a more academic route towards an understanding of communication and various theoretical perspectives. These methods include:

- Analysis of different critical readings
































# So why should **you** be interested in studying Film?

## Is this course suitable for me?


- ► There is a substantial critical analysis required therefore, students need to be confident with essay-writing.
- ▶ 30% of the overall grade is to produce a short film (4-5 minutes) along with an evaluative analysis (around 1800 words)
- We shall study 11 films in considerable detail. Therefore, students must be prepared to think critically, considering ethical, political, social and cultural values.
- ➤ Your GCSE grade in English Language and English Literature is important. Subjects like Art, History and Drama will also have transferable skills.



## Course Overview: Representation and Diversity

- ▶ We have selected 11 films from 25 provided from the Exam Board. Of these 25 films, there are:
- 2 feature films and a short film featuring characters with a disability or different ability
- 7 films made by female directors
- 14 films featuring female protagonists
- 5 films featuring LGBTQ+ protagonists
- 8 films made by directors from the global majority
- 10 films featuring protagonists from the global majority





- > 70% exam / 30% coursework
- Mock paper taken at the end of Year 12
- ▶ 2 papers at the end of Yr.13
- Length of A Level papers: 2½ hours each
- Questions are Essay-based

#### **Component 3: Production**

- Non-exam assessment
- 30% of qualification
- This component assesses one production and its evaluative analysis. Learners produce:
- either a short film (4-5 minutes) or a screenplay for a short film (1600-1800 words) and a digitally photographed storyboard of a key section from the screenplay
- an evaluative analysis (1600 1800 words).
